While ever such passion for the sport exists, it remains only to manage the change for ATR to survive and flourish in its new format.

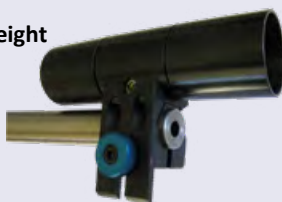

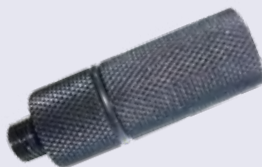

Women Rifle Shooters

The Journey for Recognition and the North Queensland Influence

Small-bore shooting began in Australia in the mid-19th century, and women were an integral part of this form of shooting sport. Small-bore shooting generally involved .22 calibre shooting at distances up to 50 metres. By the Great War, small-bore shooting became known as 'miniature rifle shooting' and clubs were formed around Australia. The rifle used by miniature rifle clubs was the Lee-Enfield rifle adapted to fire .22 cartridges. Because the miniature rifles fired a smaller calibre and produced a much-reduced recoil, the miniature rifles were popular with women shooters.

On May 10, 1913, the Officer Supervising Rifle Clubs in Queensland, Captain Jackson, recommended the formation of the Townsville Miniature Rifle Club with its range at the dead-end of Walker Street below the reservoirs. On June 10, 1917, while the full-bore rifle clubs were in forced recess due to the Great War, the Captain of the Townsville Rifle Club, Chas E. Johnsey,

requested Council permission to establish a miniature rifle range in the gully in Stokes Street above the Methodist Church. It is not known how long this club operated.

At the conclusion of the Great War, most women left the sport, albeit female participation in small-bore shooting remained socially acceptable. This was not to be for female participation in full-bore shooting. After Federation, the Department of the Army took control of rifle clubs from the various States under what was known as the Australian Rifle Clubs Regulations, contained within the Defence Act 1903. These Regulations denied women the opportunity of rifle club membership and entry into major shooting competitions. Following the tragic Port Arthur shootings, these Regulations were repealed by the Federal Government in February 1997.

Many clubs quietly ignored the Regulations and held 'Ladies Days' or simply allowed interested women to participate at club level. For example, in 1908 a Ladies Day was held at Cluden Rifle Range in Townsville which resulted in 28 participants. In July 1953, there was a Ladies Shoot in Mackay and in June 1954, it was reported in the newspapers that women competed regularly at the Hughenden Rifle Club.

The first detailed record of a North Queensland Rifle Association (NQRA) ladies' competition was for a match that occurred on May 1, 1899 at Charters Towers. The Northern Miner reported that "the ladies of Charters Towers made a new departure in sporting matters yesterday by inaugurating a Ladies Rifle Club". The literature does not link the Charters Towers Ladies Rifle Club to the male-dominated Charters Towers Rifle Club directly, but there is evidence that the two were connected. Records show that ladies events were also held at Proserpine in the early 1900s.

Three Charters Towers lady shooters were Miss F Winkle, Mrs J R Thompson and Mrs R J Fisher. These ladies shot over 200, 500 and 600 yards at their first meeting. Miss Florence Winkle, Mrs Fisher's sister, was the first lady shooter to score a bullseye in North Queensland. Mrs Fisher and Mrs Thompson were wives of Charters Towers Rifle Club members Mr R J Fisher and Mr J R Thompson. Mr Fisher won the 1900 Queens Prize and Mr Thompson won the 1904 Kings Prize. Messrs Thompson and Fisher acted as coaches to the ladies' team.

The North Queensland Register reported on August 18, 1902 that "the principal winners at the Hughenden Rifle Club meeting on Coronation Day were Marwedel and Turbayne".

"The former made 49 out of a possible 50, while the latter was in capital form too."

On June 15, 1903 the North Queensland Register reported that "some half dozen ladies appeared on the range for practice on Saturday afternoon".

"Mrs W Toll again securing several bulls, kneeling. The ladies match at the NQ Rifle Association's Annual Meeting is causing a lot of interest, and there are about twelve practising at present, and I am informed that three or four more are likely to take it on this coming week, so that we should see a very keen competition amongst the ladies. The member says that he has had some of the fair sex out trying their skill twice this week, and they are getting along very well. The three who shot on Thursday last averaged just over 28, which is very good at the second-class target.

"I think the Council of the Association should make it known what size target is to be used for the competition as there is not much time for practice and there is nothing like practising on the target that will be used in competition. It is to be hoped they will decide in favour of the second class as many who have shot for the past 15 years consider the third class is too difficult a target to shoot at."

If this last sentence is correct then it may be the ladies in North Queensland were shooting as early as 1888 which is the year of the first NQRA Queens Prize.

The next record of a lady's competition was in 1904 again at Charters Towers. According to the press, the name of the competition was the 'Ladies Match' and this competition was shot in conjunction with the 1904 Kings Prize shoot. The report states that seven ladies competed in the Ladies Match. The lady competitors included Miss Willmett, Mrs Thompson, Mrs McKedie, Mrs Rattray, Mrs Carroll, Mrs Mattingly and Miss Carr. The match was a seven round competition shot over 300 yards.

The Register report includes a photograph of the winner of the Ladies Match, Miss Emily Willmett, however the photograph of Miss Willmett cannot be adequately reproduced. Fortunately, an excellent photograph of Miss Willmett's winning target has been preserved for posterity. Her winning score was 33 out of a 35 possible. Ladies shot on a target with a slightly larger bullseye (20 inches at 300 yards) than men. The actual dimensions of the target were not recorded.

Ladies Match results

Miss Willmett came from a prominent Townsville business family who owned and operated Willmett's Printing Company. Her father was Thankful Percy Willmett, a former Mayor of Townsville on several occasions including 1880-81, 1883-84 and 1902.

The next record of lady shooters comes from Proserpine. Many photographs of Proserpine's lady shooters were taken about the turn of the century. Unfortunately, they lack detail in terms of the names of the ladies involved, events and the actual period in which the photographs on the next page were taken.

Not allowing females competitors in open competition outside of clubs was continually challenged by some segments of the sport, particularly in North Queensland.

At the October 13, 1956 North Queensland Rifle Association (NQRA) Council Meeting held in Townsville, the members present were requested by the Cardwell Rifle Club to explain why women were not permitted to enrol in rifle clubs and why they were not allowed to participate at Association and District Rifle Club Union Prize Meetings.

The meeting minutes show: "The President of NQRA, Military Command Secretary Mr PJ Sheehan, said only those women who were honorary members of rifle clubs prior to 1937 retained the rights of honorary membership, according to a ruling by the Solicitor-General in 1937.

"The Director of Australian Rifle Clubs had informed the Australian Council of State Rifle Associations (ACSRA) in 1952 and on other occasions that the Department of the Army Regulations did not provide for admission of females to the rifle club movement in any capacity or as competitors at Prize Meetings. Army policy was not to train women to use weapons and the ACSRA, in the interests of the rifle club movement, generally has to adhere to such policy."

The matter of women competing in open competition continued to be raised. At the NQRA Council Meeting

held in Townsville on October 19, 1957, the decision to deny women entry into shooting competitions was again on the agenda.

"The Council Secretary, Mr J. B. Bannan said he had written to Miss P. Clift on April, 15 1957 and courteously explained to her the reasons for the Association's non-acceptance of her entry for the 1957 NQRA Championships; since then her father had written three letters to the Association debating the Department of the Army's action in restricting membership to males only and demanding copies of the Regulations, minutes, etc," revealed the minutes of the October 1957 meeting.

"Mr D. Rooney (the Townsville District Union representative) stated Mr Clift was regarded as an eccentric gentleman in the Cardwell area and he had already argued the same matter with ACSRA and the Department of the Army,"

By mid-1960, the Department of the Army was starting to distance itself from the rifle clubs and the clubs headed towards a future of self-administration. At the

NQRA Council Meeting on April 15, 1960, Mr AL Kidd asked if the Army policy would be changed to once again allow lady shooters to participate. Advice provided was the matter had not yet been reconsidered.

Not content with the Army's discriminatory policy, the NQRA submitted the matter for consideration at the November 1960 meeting of the ACSRA to be held in Melbourne. The NQRA submission sums up the concern:

"Enrolment of Females as Active Members of Rifle Clubs

The NQRA Delegate has been instructed to ask the Australian Council Meeting (5 & 6 November 1960) to reconsider its policy (refer to Minute 48 of ACSRA Annual Meeting held November 1956) re enrolment of females as members of Australian Rifle Clubs and to recommend to the Department of Army that females be permitted to enrol as Active Members of rifle clubs, at least in the area of far Northern and North Western

Queensland controlled by the North Queensland Rifle Association.

Women in remote and isolated areas maintain a tremendous interest in all of the activities of their men-folk, whether work or sport. In many instances, rifle clubs provide the only organised weekend pastime within many miles' radius of a tiny country centre. Men-folk spend the greater part of a day travelling and taking part in a club shoot, and enjoying the social aspect of the gathering; currently Regulations unfairly prohibit their women - many of whom develop into excellent rifle shots - from indulging in such recreational and social activities.

The NQRA, in its 73 years of existence, has produced a number of outstanding women rifle shooters. These women, by their bearing and behaviour, have proved that they make worthy members of any country rifle club; never in its history has the NQRA had need to resort to disciplinary action involving female members.

Ability to use a rifle proficiently, among other things, cannot be denied as one of the average country woman's most desirable accomplishments. Where could better training be obtained than on a rifle range?"

After 1960, the Department of the Army ceded control of rifle clubs to the State Rifle Associations and women were finally allowed to participate at all levels of the sport. As has been demonstrated on many occasions, women have proven to be equally skilled as men at long

distance rifle shooting.

Regrettably, the decision came too late for Miss Peggy Clift (from the Cardwell Rifle Club), who having been denied entry to the 1957 NQRA Queens Prize, changed to shotgun shooting winning the Queensland Clay Sparrow Championship in that year.

One of NQRA's top female shooters was Mrs Eve Winters (nee Condon), a school teacher. Eve joined the Ravenshoe Rifle Club in 1966 and was taught to shoot by many of the top shots in that club including her father, Ces Condon, who won the 1982 NQRA Queens Prize. Eve showed exceptional marksmanship skills which resulted in her becoming the first female to represent Australia at the mecca of long-range shooting, Bisley UK, in 1974. She was also the only female in the 1974 Australian Team. Eve achieved many successes before retiring from the sport in 1992.

Another lady to follow in her family's footsteps is Gail Christie. Gail Christie commenced rifle shooting at Bowen in 1980. Gail was a member of the Bowen Rifle Club for seven years before the Christie family moved to Ayr and is now an active member of the Townsville Marksmen Rifle Club. Gail always knew that there was a family connection to the Halifax Rifle Club but was uncertain of the circumstances. Only recently was she able to bridge that connection when she became aware that her great grandfather AW Carr, a founding

member of the Halifax Club, won the NQRA Queens Prize in 1898.

Female interest and participation in Australian full-bore shooting grew quickly after the Department of the Army relaxed its tight control over rifle clubs in the early 1960s. The growth in female club membership saw the establishment of the national ladies' teams shooting competition in 1968. The ladies' teams from the various States and Territories contested the Medland Match a total of 40 times in the next 50 years to 2018.

The Medland Match was in some ways an early pathway for the women to demonstrate their shooting talents, thereby ensuring their consideration for selection in the State and Territory Open Teams that assemble to contest the national Teams Matches every 18 months. Rifle shooting remains one of the very few sports where gender provides no advantage, and men and women compete equally side by side.

Lady shooters gravitated to the F Class disciplines following their introduction which resulted in a decline in the numbers of ladies shooting the traditional Target Rifle discipline. Consequently, only three States were able to field a team to contest and celebrate this 50th anniversary National Ladies Teams Matches at Belmont in 2018 under the Target Rifle specified match rules.

To increase participation NQRA members, Gail Christie, Janine Mahony and Elisabetta Gianasi formulated and

submitted a proposal to the Australian Ladies Rifle Association that would enable mixed discipline teams to participate in the 2018 Championships alongside the Target Rifle Teams on a trial basis. The proposal using the MCSI (Mixed Category Scoring Index) system to calculate the scores was approved and the offer to enter a mixed discipline team was extended to all states and territories. NQRA was the only association to nominate a mixed discipline team and they decided to participate anyway to demonstrate the beneficial possibilities of their proposal by entering a team consisting of two target rifle, two F-Standard and one FTR shooter.

Subsequently at the Australian Ladies Rifle Association AGM, the need to revitalise the competition was accepted and it was decided to retire the Medland Match trophy and proceed with a new multi discipline competition using the MCSI scoring system to be known as the Shepherd Match. The inaugural competition is scheduled for Bendigo in 2020, and State and Territories associations will be able to nominate up to two teams of five shooters made up of any combination of TR, FS, FO or FTR disciplines.

Returning to the North Queensland shooting scene, in 1988, an NQRA ladies team met in competition with the visiting Great Britain Ladies Team at Mackay. This competition hosted by NQRA was part of Australia's bicentennial celebrations.

Three lady shooters were selected in the Australian Rifle Team that entered the World Long Range Teams Championship (the prestigious 'Palma Trophy' which was first contested in 1876) in Canada in 2007. Jan Dyer (NT) was the Team Master Coach, Janet Wagland (WA) was one of four wind coaches and Gillian Webb-Enslin (QLD) was one of the 16 shooters. This was the first Australian team to select female coaches for the Palma Trophy and the team placed third, winning bronze. More significantly, the female combination of Gillian Webb-Enslin (shooter), coached by Janet Wagland, established a new world record score of 896.53/900 over distances of 800, 900 and 1000 yards. This record is now part of history because the international shooting community agreed to change the target scoring dimensions for the next World Long Range Teams Championship which was held in Australia in 2011.

In February 2019, the Australian Rifle Team rose to the top, winning the World Long Range Teams Championship Gold and the 'Palma Trophy' at Trentham, New Zealand, arguably one of the most challenging rifle ranges in the world. There were three women in this victorious team: Kathryn Kent (NSW), Donna Negus (NSW) and Gillian Webb-Enslin (QLD).

Today women shooters are well established members of rifle clubs across Australia, providing a valuable contribution to the sport. They enjoy equal standing as full-bore shooting competitors and hold many important positions at club, district, state and national levels.

Many clubs are privileged and strengthened by having husband and wife, father and daughter or mother and

daughter combinations as the sport encourages and supports participation by all family members. The Townsville Marksmen Rifle Club is the envy of many clubs as it boasts having five active and competitive husband and wife members in the club.

Friday November 8, 2019 marked a significant achievement for full-bore shooting for a husband and wife team resident in ACT. Donna Negus was crowned Australia's Target Sport Athlete of the Year - Senior Female, and husband Steve was crowned Australia's Target Sport Athlete of the Year - Senior Male. Congratulations Donna and Steve on your achievements over a lifetime in the sport. Both were members of the victorious Australian Rifle Team in New Zealand in February 2019. This is the first time a husband and wife have won these awards, amazingly both in the same year.
